Our guest speaker for the March 27th meeting was our own Jeff McDonald who told us all we wanted to know about the grocery business. One important note that Jeff brought up, was the paper vs plastic question. The answer is **RESUABLE**. Paper bags take an enormous amount of energy to produce and generate large amounts of pollution. While plastic bags cheap and easy to manufacture, never degrade and will be around for thousands of years. Ray's now has reusable grocery bags available, For every reusable bag Ray's will give a small rebate to patrons.

Everything you ever wanted to know about a Grocery Store

Our guest speaker for the March 27th meeting was our own Jeff McDonald who told us all we wanted to know about the grocery business. His emphasis was about Ray's Fine Foods in Sisters. He told us to expect higher food prices within the near future because of the high cost of fuel for delivery trucks and everything else connected with the production of foods. Many farmers across the country are taking crops such as food corn out of production and in their place they are planting corn that is only suitable for making bio fuels. A shortage in corn will increase the price of cereals and anything else made out of corn. Other crops are also being replaced to make fuels. The cost of transporting the foods that are produced is adding to the cost the markets must pay for the items they sell. Hops that are used to make beer are becoming scarce which will increase the cost of beer. Jeff said the milk cost will most likely remain about the same because much of the milk purchased comes from areas such as California where the dairy farmers are subsidized by the government. Oregon does not subsidize the dairy industry.

Jeff told us the new Ray's market in Sisters will be open around November 3rd. The store will be much larger. There will be a branch of the Bank of the Cascades inside. The meat market will be twice as large and many more services will be offered to the customers. The Bakery/Deli will be twice as large. There will be a salad bar and many more specialty foods available. Another new addition to the market will be a digital disk developing kiosk where you can put you disk into the machine, order including editing and prints from 4 x 6" to large enlargements will be printed out with a long waiting period. The Bend store has one of these machines and it works very well. The wine department will be twice as large with many more choices available. When the new store opens they will hire about 40 new full time employees who will have full benefits.

Interesting statistics given by Jeff were that Super Bowl Football day has replaced all other holidays in the amount of food purchased. Last year about \$5.6 billion dollars were spent in US, not all at Ray's but they did very well. Without surprise beer was the food product most purchased on that day.

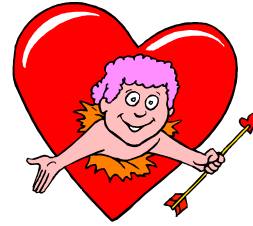
