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First Evening Program A Great Success

More than 60 people including 15 Kiwanians listened Oct. 21 as Sisters' resident naturalist, Jim Anderson spun his tales of working wildlife and people's interaction with it.

Titled Coyote, Wolf and Human, Anderson's subject for the initial program is "An Eclectic Visit with a Northwest Naturalist." The free program will be held in the Community Hall at the Sisters/Camp Sherman Fire Department. Light refreshments will be served.

Kiwanis is developing the evening series because of the awareness that Sisters has a wealth of potential presentations worthy of longer time and a broader audience than is available at the Kiwanis Club's regular Thursday morning meetings.

Anderson, whose work appears regularly in The Nugget, was a recent speaker at Kiwanis, where he was accompanied by a Great Horned Owl. His entertaining and enlightening appearance stimulated Kiwanis to attempt a new public format for such programs.

first Kiwanis International President. Hixson, who served from 1916 to 1918, holds the distinction of being the only leader to serve two terms as Kiwanis International President. Overall, his record accounts for more than 50 years of dedication to Kiwanis service.

Cell Phone for Soldiers Program "Simply Outstanding"

Cell Phones for Soldiers was started in April 2004 by 13 year-old Brittany Bergquist and her 12 year-old brother, Robbie, of Norwell, Massachusetts. After reading a news report about a local soldier who ran up a huge phone bill calling home from Iraq, they decided they wanted to do something to help. Brittany and Robbie donated their piggy bank money and collected snack money from their friends at school. With \$21.00, they went to the bank to open an account. The South Shore Savings Bank of Hanover, Massachusetts, donated \$500.00 to help them get

started. Their goal is to provide every military personnel with prepaid calling cards, with an ultimate goal of providing satellite phones, video and VOIP communicating equipment on overseas bases. They have delivered over 500,000 calling cards and raised over \$2 million in donations.

Cell phones are collected and sent to ReCellular for recycling. The amount received for recycling is used to buy pre-paid calling cards for military personnel in Iraq, Iran, Afghanistan and other parts of the world.

You can drop off your cell phones at Susan's Cleaners in the Three Wind Shopping Center, Monday to Friday 10am to 5pm.

Almost 1,500 cell phones have been sent from the cleaners. Each cell phone is worth at least one hour's conversation. The newer the phone, of course, the more value and more calling time.

Kiwanis Remembers

On November 11th we will remember the fallen veterans of many foreign wars. It is of course a memorial day designed to remind us of the many sacrifices so many have made in order that we, the survivors, can enjoy the good life and continue to pursue our desires in a place of freedom and safety.

The 1918 date for the event was originally selected to correspond with the official ending of hostilities between opposing forces in the Great War and was known as Armistice Day. After a relatively short time of peace a second large conflict erupted in Europe and shortly thereafter the first Great War became known as World War I and the second conflict as World War II.

When peace was eventually achieved, November 11th became the date to remember the fallen of both wars. In the United States the designation of the remembrance day was changed to Veteran's Day and it has become a day to remember the fallen American servicemen of all foreign wars.

One way or another we all have links to people who served their country in a time of need and in many cases will have a relative, neighbor or friend who was one of the fallen. It is fitting we take time to remember their sacrifice.

It is also perhaps an opportunity to remember a fallen comrade from another type of service. In this context we refer to the great people who were members of Kiwanis. Some years past the Kiwanis Club of Sisters adopted a program to honor members who departed this earth while in service to the club and the community. The Sisters club commemorates the passing of a member by donating a bench to be placed at a convenient location around the City of Sisters so that residents and tourists have a place to sit and rest if the need and desire so dictates.

Each bench carries a plaque identifying a departed club member. As nature took its inevitable course the number of donated benches has grown over the years and there are now some 21 located strategically around the City.

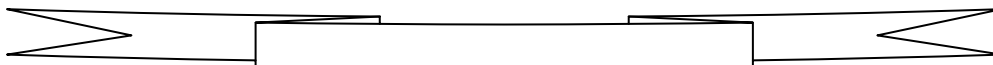

Our Purpose and Mission:

Kiwanis is an organization for men and women who want to improve their communities through participation in service projects of *LOCAL*, national and international importance. In all programs, participation is the key word for service by members. Weekly business meetings include presentations on a variety of interesting topics. In its three-decade history, Sisters Kiwanis has been involved in the development and support of many community organizations, including Scouts, Campfire, Little League, organized soccer, Habitat for Humanity, and Sisters Park and Recreation District (formerly SOAR) to name just a few. In addition, Kiwanis volunteers maintain and staff the community food bank, which provides emergency food boxes for less fortunate citizens in the area. Kiwanis also has provided park-type benches throughout the city, and built a playground apparatus at the main city park in Sisters. The organization was a major contributor to the city's new ball field complex. Individual Kiwanis members have had leadership roles in many civic and cultural organizations in Sisters, helping provide continuity in the growth of the community through the Kiwanis motto, "Service to the community with an emphasis on youth".
