## A Message from Your Historian

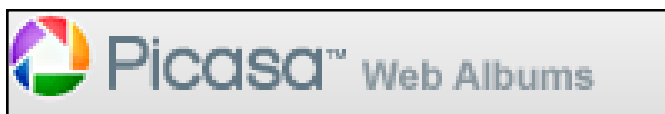

## Free Financial-Fitness Classes in Sisters

A four-part series of free two-hour "financial-fitness" classes in Sisters, which will address everything from budgeting, banking and borrowing to credit-card management. Hosted by NeighborImpact (the Redmond-based nonprofit group that provides a number of home-related community services to residents of Deschutes, Crook and Jefferson counties). Open to all interested Sisters-area residents who'd like to learn how to make more informed financial decisions, the educational program is being offered in partnership with the City of Sisters and the Bank of the Cascades. The four classes, which run every other Tuesday from 6-8 p.m., began Sept. 22. Here's the schedule of remaining topics:
